Biographical Sketch

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Reid Hastie has degrees from Stanford University, the University of California at San Diego, and Yale University in Psychology. He has taught at Harvard University, Northwestern University, the University of Colorado (where he was Director of the Center for Research on Judgment and Policy), and is now a Professor of Behavioral Science on the faculty of the Chicago Booth Graduate School of Business and a member of the Center for Decision Research. He has served on review panels for the National Science Foundation, the National Institute of Mental Health, the National Research Council; and on seventeen professional journal editorial boards. His research was funded continuously by the National Science Foundation and the National Institutes of Health from 1975 through 2004.

His primary research interests are in the areas of judgment and decision making (managerial, legal, medical, engineering, and personal), memory and cognition, and social psychology. He has published over 100 articles in scientific journals on these topics. He is best known for his research on legal decision making (Social Psychology in Court [with Michael Saks]; Inside the Jury [with Steven Penrod and Nancy Pennington]; Inside the Juror [edited]; and Punitive Damages: How Juries Decide [multiple authors]). He is currently studying: the psychology of investment decisions; the role of explanations in inductive inferences; the primitive sources of confidence and probability judgments; decision making competencies across the adult life span; and neural substrates of risky decisions. He is the author of Rational Choice in an Uncertain World: The Psychology of Judgment and Decision Making (with Robyn Dawes, 2009) and Wiser: Getting Beyond Groupthink to Make Groups Smarter (with Cass Sunstein, 2015).
